#### Year 7 Number Day

On Friday 7th February, Year 7 students came together for the annual Number Day activities, organised by Miss Theobald from the Maths Department.

During Period 4, half of the year group gathered in the main hall, kicking off the session with number aerobics. Some volunteers demonstrated the moves, and it was fantastic to see so much enthusiasm from everyone! The main activity was a quiz, with some tricky questions that tested their skills and determination. The final part of the session involved students creating real-life graphs, giving them a fun introduction to straight-line graphs—a topic they will explore more in their Maths curriculum.

In Period 5, the remaining Year 7 students joined in the fun and took part in a 'very strange game' exploring the properties of numbers.

Throughout the day, there was also a teacher treasure hunt, where students could take part during break, lunchtime, or at home via Satchel One. 25 teachers had been assigned a number, and students had to answer questions like: 'What is the sum of the Maths teachers?', 'Which teachers are square numbers?', and 'Which teacher is the smallest prime number?'

A new feature this year was the virtual escape room. About 25 students took part in their own time, solving problems and cracking codes to escape from 10 different rooms in the school. Some great problemsolving skills were on display!

Since September, students have answered a total of **420,922 questions correctly**, completed **5,307 hours of personalised learning**, and **180 students** have improved their times tables. 
#### Time to Talk Day

#### **Merit Update**

We've reached a significant milestone halfway through the school year - students have now earned over 60,000 merits! This is a fantastic achievement, and it's been great to see so many students engage with the rewards system.



At the weekly merit cashing-in sessions, nearly 10,000 merits have already been redeemed for rewards. Over the recent half term, we've seen a surge in bonus merits awarded: **1,520 merits** for 100% attendance, **552 merits** for attendance above 95% and **1,650 merits** for students receiving no negatives during the first Spring half term.

We're also celebrating some major milestones: **26 students** have earned 150 or more merits, **162 students** have earned 100 or more merits, and an impressive **597 students** have gained 50

or more merits. Merit cashing-in continues every Monday from 12:30 pm to 12:50 pm in the main hall.


Congratulations to all Year 7s and 8s - we can reveal the following statistics which are for this school year so far:

Safer Internet Day

Safer Internet Day is a global event that aims to promote a safer and more responsible use of technology and the internet. It encourages everyone, especially young people, to explore how they can contribute to creating a positive

online community. Each year, Safer Internet Day focuses on raising awareness about key online issues such as cyberbullying, online privacy, digital wellbeing, and the importance of respecting others in the digital world.

Safer Internet Day 2025 took place on 11th February, with the theme "Too good to be true? Protecting yourself and others from scams online." This year, the focus was on educating young people about the risks of online scams and how they can protect themselves and others.

Mrs Woods, Head of Computer Science, provided some useful resources for tutors to use in PART lesson to explore the main themes. The resources explored the growing issue of scams, including online financial and how emerging technologies like AI may change the way scammers operate. It also provided a platform for students to share their experiences and ideas on tackling online threats, and discuss the role of the government and the internet industry in keeping young people safe. Students also learnt about being safe online in their computing lessons and Year 8s had an assembly about being safer on the internet.

Safer Internet Day is the UK's biggest celebration of online safety, promoting the positive and responsible use of digital technology. At Northgate, we are proud to support Safer Internet Day as it's such an important opportunity for students to learn about online security and the support available to them.



#### Year 7 Maths: Investigating the McNugget Number

Before half term, our Year 7 Maths students embarked on an exciting mathematical investigation, exploring the concept of the McNugget Number! Working in pairs, they collaborated to solve the intriguing puzzle of determining the largest number that cannot be made using any combination of boxes of 6, 9 or 20 McNuggets.

Students began by applying their knowledge of multiples and using logical reasoning to break down the problem. They worked together to investigate patterns and formulate their ideas, testing different combinations to find solutions and uncover the McNugget Number. Their ability to work collaboratively and think critically was evident in the fact that many of them found the McNugget Number and went on to apply the skills to similar problems!

The Maths teachers were thoroughly impressed by the problems solving skills on display, the level of engagement and determination shown by all students. This hands-on investigation not only reinforced key mathematical concepts but also fostered teamwork and communication skills - and of course it was about chicken nuggets - what's not to enjoy?!

## Institut Français 'On the Road' workshops to visit Dereham Sixth Form College

We are excited to welcome the Institut Francis later this month to work with some of our Year 8 and 9 students. This is a wonderful opportunity for our pupils to experience workshops run by the Institut

Francais. Based in London, the Institut Francais has been reaching out to big cities with its "Francophonie On the Road" tour. In 2024 they toured Newcastle, Lincoln, Birmingham and Cheltenham. In 2025 they are kicking off their Roadshow at Dereham Sixth Form College.

Pupils from four local schools (up to 25 pupils from each school) will be involved. In the morning, pupils will be coming from Wayland Academy and Litcham High School. In the afternoon it is the turn of Dereham Neatherd and Dereham Northgate, who are hosting the day at Dereham Sixth Form College.

Mr Everett, Head of Languages at Northgate High School and Dereham Sixth Form college said, "The day will have a mystery theme which I can't reveal. But the details I can share are that it will be hands-on, in French, and very creative." The Institut Francais have prepared activities tailored to Year 8 and Year 9 pupils, to engage them with issues around an Environmental theme in French and for them to enjoy a creative and artistic experience.

The day will be delivered by three teachers from the Institut Français, with teachers from Northgate and the visiting schools there to support their pupils. We can't wait to tell you more!

During half term, a group of Northgate students headed to Passo Tonale in Italy for the ski trip.


