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Accelerated Reader Celebrations

Just before Easter, the Library was filled to the brim with a celebration for those that achieved their Accelerated Reader targets for the term.

Over 40 students achieved their targets and received their bronze star badges, with a further 33 students achieving their silver star badges, meaning they have achieved their target in both the autumn and spring terms.

Jessica B, Year 7, who received her bronze star badge, said of the celebration event, 'I enjoyed how everything was Easter themed and how much effort they put into it. We took a picture and there was food and drinks with little ducks or Easter rabbits with chocolate inside them. My favourite book is Malory Towers and Harry Potter because you can escape reality and be in your own world. I sat with my friends and we had a little party between us, we also said cheers!'

Natalie P, Year 8, who received her silver star badge, said,

'I enjoy Accelerated Reader because it makes reading fun and rewarding, encouraging improvement, and tracking progress. Celebrations in AR are like a way to recognise accomplishments and motivate readers. As for favourite books, it's got to be Harry Potter by J.K. Rowling. Reading for pleasure is important because it improves vocabulary and offers a

relaxing escape. AR also helps develop reading skills. At the party we got our star badges silver or bronze depending on if you achieved your target last term as well. We had rice krispie/oat cakes, squash and crocheted rabbits or chicks with an Easter egg inside!'



Merit Update

At the start of the summer term, students are close to achieving 80,000 merits! Over the Easter holidays, 1530 bonus merits were awarded to those with 100% attendance for the second spring half term, 744 merits to those with >95% and 1420 to those who received no negatives - well done! Plenty of badges and certificates were handed out in celebration assemblies and now we have 21 students with more than 200 merits, 89 with more than 150 merits and a fantastic 345 students have gained 100 or more merits.

Merit cashing in continues to take place on Mondays this year, in the main hall from 12.30pm – 12.50pm. Don't forget merit totals reset to zero in the summer so get spending! Take a look at what you can exchange your merits for in our rewards catalogue. Attenborough maintain their

Attendance Matters



PACT Animal Sanctuary, located in Norfolk, is the region's largest all-animal sanctuary and rescue centre. They rescue, rehabilitate, and rehome neglected, injured, and abandoned animals, specialising in those with behavioural challenges. Home to over 1,200 animals, PACT also offers educational programs on animal care and provides animal-assisted therapy to support individuals facing disabilities, ill health, or unemployment.

PACT Animal Sanctuary's mission goes beyond just rescuing animals - it's about creating a compassionate environment where both animals and people thrive. They provide a safe haven for a wide variety of animals, including farm animals, exotics, and pets, all while promoting a no-kill policy. Through community outreach, PACT fosters a greater understanding of the needs of animals, encouraging empathy and responsible pet ownership. Their work includes helping animals with special needs, and they offer resources for people interested in adopting or supporting their mission.

By supporting PACT, the Northgate community is helping to fund essential care, shelter, and rehabilitation for animals that might otherwise have no chance. We are proud to have raised money for such a worthwhile cause and of our students and staff for their generosity. Well done to everyone involved!

SPARX Maths Success continues

Students in Years 9, 10, and 11 have continued to demonstrate fantastic commitment to their weekly SPARX Maths homework, consistently showcasing a strong

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and addressing any gaps in knowledge, helping students build confidence and fluency.

Year 11 students in particular have made impressive use of the Independent Learning section,

grasp of the topics covered. The personalised questions remain an excellent tool for identifying

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especially in the lead-up to their GCSE exams.

Since the beginning of the school year, students have collectively answered an incredible **577,953** questions correctly, spent **6,886** hours engaged in personalised learning, and **230** students have improved their times tables recall. Many have also progressed to new levels, with a large number of virtual certificates sent home to celebrate their achievements. Keep it up - your hard work is paying off!

We're also excited to announce that Year 8 students will now be taking part in SPARX Maths. We look forward to seeing how they progress in the weeks ahead and celebrating their achievements and successes.

Year 9 Student earns the Chief Scout's Gold Award

We are proud to announce that Year 9 student, Hope C, has recently earned her Chief Scout's Gold Award with 1st Dereham Scouts. To mark this impressive achievement, Hope was presented with a framed certificate by her former Scout Leader, who returned to a meeting especially for the occasion.

The Chief Scout's Gold Award is the highest honour a Scout can achieve. To earn this prestigious award, Hope completed all nine Challenge Awards - World, Skills, Creative, Outdoors, Adventure, Expedition, Teamwork, Team Leader, and Personal Challenge - as well as six Activity or Staged Activity badges.

These Challenge Awards encourage Scouts to step outside their comfort zones and take on new challenges.



The Chief Scout's Gold Award is a significant milestone in a Scout's journey, marking the culmination of everything learned before advancing to the Explorers program. Although it requires considerable dedication and effort, it also offers Scouts the opportunity to experience a wide range of exciting activities.

Hope completed her Gold Award in just under a year and shared that she is both happy and proud to have achieved this remarkable goal. Well done Hope!



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<u>Digging Deeper: Composting with the Orchard</u> <u>Committee</u>

The Orchard Committee continues to grow in knowledge. Last term, students were learning all about composting, thanks to support from local Master Composters, Carl and Glenis Watling, who delivered two sessions to the group.

Students were able to showcase the progress they've made so far in composting, taking Carl and Glenis on a tour of The Orchard and receiving expert advice on how to improve and maintain the compost bins. They learned about the importance of correct bin positioning - not too sunny and not too shady, to balance warmth and moisture, as well as the need for a good mix of materials. A healthy compost heap should be roughly half "green" materials (like grass cuttings, stinging nettles, and fruit and veg peelings) and half "brown" materials (such as twigs, cardboard, dry leaves, and straw).

One key lesson was the importance of aeration - turning the compost once a month to introduce oxygen and speed up the decomposition process. Students also learned to monitor moisture levels, aiming for a balance that's neither too dry nor too damp. As part of the session, students rolled up their sleeves and got hands-on with the compost bins - emptying, mixing, and refilling four of them. They also added cut-down holly branches and discussed future composting plans with the school's grounds team, including the potential to compost grass clippings.

The students were then encouraged to think about how they might use the compost they're producing. Their ideas included, potting up germinated seeds, spreading around the apple trees and hedge whips to suppress weeds, and enriching the raised beds once plants are planted out.

The highlight of the second session was the introduction to wormeries. Carl and Glenis demonstrated two types- one bought and one homemade using stackable boxes. Students explored the kinds of materials worms can digest, and learned how the process produces not only compost but also a liquid fertiliser (worm wee!), which can be diluted and used on plants.

To round off the session, students took part in an interactive game to test their composting knowledge - sorting items into 'compostable', 'non-compostable', and 'caution' categories. There was plenty of discussion, reasoning, and shared learning, as students considered the environmental impact of everyday waste.

Finally, using compost brought in by Carl and Glenis, students had the chance to examine living organisms in compost under a digital microscope provided by The Tree Council to The Orchard Committee. They were amazed to see tiny creatures moving about, evidence of a thriving compost ecosystem and a powerful reminder of nature's recycling process at work.

The Orchard Committee continues to gain valuable real-world skills in sustainability, teamwork, and environmental care. We're incredibly proud of their efforts and the enthusiasm they bring to every session. Thank you to Carl and Glenis for providing such informative sessions. We look forward to putting their advice into practice and welcoming them back again to The Orchard.

The range of work, showcases the diverse approach our Art students had taken to demonstrate their understanding of the theme of Identity.



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We also have some excellent RM pieces that were created in Technology lessons. Mrs Mottley, Head of Design Faculty, commented, 'I am very proud of our pupils, and the exhibition of work is a snapshot into the journey art can take.'

'Some of our Year 9 pupils will be taking one or more of our subjects as an option, and so I am very excited of the work they will produce in two years' time for their GCSE, if the standard is this high already.'



Poppy, 9Courage, said, 'For our final pieces we were given the creative freedom to design a piece of art inspired by our chosen artist. I took inspiration from the abstract artist Sonia Delaunay and her piece 'Rhythm' to create my final painting.'

'I used multiple mediums such as acrylic paint, colouring pencils and canvas. The main content of my painting is a flower. I am pleased with my final piece and look forward to hopefully doing GCSE Art next year.'

The first event saw members of the Orchard Committee head to the coppice area just behind the

playing fields, where they carried out a thorough litter pick. Their efforts resulted in the collection of approximately nine bags of rubbish, much of which was historic - including some

> crisp packets dating back as far as 2013! The group made a visible improvement to the area and enjoyed the experience so much that they've already expressed interest in organising another litter pick in the near future.

The second event was led by Northgate's Environment Team and took place during a lunchtime. Staff and students generously gave up their break to help tidy up the school site, collecting a further five bags of litter.

Making Sense of SEND are free events for parents/carers who have a child with SEND, 0 - 25 years. They are also for professionals who work with them.


The next Making Sense of SEND event is on Thursday 22 May, 10-12 at Bawdeswell Village Hall. This event has the theme 'transition'.



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


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Year 7 French Windmill Exhibition
